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# Level Four Rap Around with One Bead

This fall, Level 4 is collaborating with local non-profit One Bead on a semester-long service project during their Rap Around block. Rap Around is a class that each level in the school takes, named after a local Boston TV show that aired in the late 1980s, which hosted teens discussing topics relevant to their lives. Rap Around at NS is a class where kids explore how to express their feelings, grow friendships, and develop social skills and a strong, positive sense of identity. In Levels 3 and 4, students are introduced to bigger picture topics that help them understand themselves within the context of community, and they work on allyship, leadership, and finding their voices as citizens.

One Bead seemed like a good fit for the beginning of the Level 4 school year, as their focus is on student activism and empowerment. The greeting on their website is "Welcome, change-makers, go-getters, and dream-chasers." Sounds like our students!

The One Bead Youth Leadership Program is a 10week course that starts with helping students identify issues in their community that they feel passionate about, and provides a \$1,000 grant to support a service project that addresses the issue. Students choose an issue as individuals or in small groups, create an action plan for how they would use \$1,000 to work towards their goal of raising awareness, making change, or creating impact. Their action plan includes defining concrete steps, identifying the target audience, and creating a budget. They will pitch their ideas to their classmates, and the class will choose one project to move forward on as a team of 17. Practicing public speaking, product and graphic design, and other entrepreneurial skills are all part of the One Bead process. NS teachers have added the element of discussing "stake": asking the students to think about their stake in a particular issue, and investigate who else in the community might have a stake.



Level 4 has been working with the organization since the second week of school, with support from One Bead mentor Abby Wocher, in collaboration with their usual Rap Around teachers, Johnny and Lisa. The students are in the action-plan-building phase, and will pitch to their classmates soon. Stay tuned to hear what community issue they choose and what impact they make!
